The Friends Wildlife Project by Don Lucke and John Frank

The Wildlife Project is all about providing another generation or more of children with an outdoor education opportunity that includes learning about native Wisconsin wildlife. In a recent letter of support for the project, Ben Bergey, DNR Director of Parks Division said, "This project is designed to improve the animal living spaces, trails, viewing areas and interpretive resources...[and will] ...include a modern facility design resulting in an enhanced learning environment for school groups and visitors to the property."

The design and engineering drawings have now been completed for Phase 1 which will create a new and expanded living environment for the wolves, coyotes and foxes. The design documents are detailed enough to allow us to proceed with cost estimates and a better defined path for fundraising. (cont. on page 2)

We're making good fundraising progress thanks to one hundred percent of Friends board members who have pledged or contributed special gifts totaling \$10,000 to the Friends specifically for the Wildlife Project. We also have applied for a grant from the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Fund and are optimistic that with the award of this grant, the matching funds provided by the Friends of MacKenzie, and year-end gifts, we will have committed funds over \$60,000 towards our \$300,000 goal moving into 2018. Thanks to all the Friends volunteers who have committed to help keep fundraising efforts moving forward.

We have started making presentations about the project to local businesses and civic groups. We offered a tour of the wildlife area for members of the Poynette Chamber in September and presented at a Lodi Rotary meeting in October. We are scheduled to present to the Portage Rotary in January. But these presentations are just the beginning!

During the cold winter months ahead, we need volunteers to help spread the word about the Wildlife Project to a larger audience, including local businesses and civic groups, and ultimately the general public. Following one of our largest wood splitting days in late May, most of our work days were focused on helping with set up for the Fall Festival event: a fresh paint job for our hay rack wagon, clearing brush and trail grooming along the hay rack route and, of course, the all-hands support for the Festival set-up day. Later in the summer we completed six work days, falling scrub trees and brush clearing in various areas around the wildlife exhibit -- this effort really opened the spaces and greatly improved the view along the North pathways, especially for the badger. Look for a surprise come maple time as we've cleared the tall buckthorn from the sugar bush area east of the Badger Den. All-in-all, volunteers put in a total of just over 350 hours on these scheduled work days. We will add a few more hours in December as we continue with support for the Center's invasive cork tree removal program.

The beautiful weather has welcomed many visitors, students and scouts to experience the MacKenzie Center over the past few months. Since July, the property has hosted over 4600 students for day and overnight education field trips. I am thrilled to announce that of 57 visiting groups, 24 were new to the MacKenzie Center! In addition to our education programming, the property hosted four Learn to Hunt events this fall, allowing students to experience the Center while learning to be responsible, safe hunters.

Staff and volunteers have been working diligently on many improvement projects across the property including invasive species removal, facility repairs and upgrades, and the development of interpretive signage. The forests are also changing as the removal of a prohibited species, *Amur cork* tree, has begun property wide and a forest regeneration harvest occurs on the south end of the property. The wildlife exhibit has also seen many improvements from brush and invasive removal to the installation of new automatic waterers and a bison shifting gate. Great enhancements are occurring property-wide!

Volunteers should look for more information to come on a new volunteer hour recording system. While the log book will remain in the Finishing House, a new online recording system will be available in January! Also, many new family-friendly events will be held at MacKenzie in 2018. Be sure to check in soon for event dates and details.

Thank you all for supporting me through my first six month as property manager of the Center. I am eager to experience another season at MacKenzie. As always, thank you to all of you for your work and dedication to the MacKenzie Center.
